## SUPERIOR COURT OF THE DISTRICT OF COLUMBIA ADMINISTRATIVE ORDER 07-11

(After Hours Temporary Protection Order Pilot Program)

**WHEREAS**, at present, there is no procedure for domestic violence victims to obtain emergency temporary protection orders (ETPO's) after regular business hours or on weekends; and

**WHEREAS,** having the ability to obtain ETPO's outside normal business hours would in some cases substantially enhance safety for victims, especially where an immediate arrest is not feasible; and

**WHEREAS**, the Office of the Attorney General, the Metropolitan Police Department, domestic violence victim advocates, and the On Call Advocacy Pilot Program have agreed to establish a pilot program to provide services after hours in order to make it possible to obtain ETPO's outside normal business hours:

## **NOW, THEREFORE,** it is by the Court,

**ORDERED,** that petitions for emergency temporary protection orders will be heard by the Emergency Judge on duty, (1) when an intra-family offense occurs after five o'clock p.m. (5:00 p.m.) and before five o'clock a.m. (5:00 a.m.) on a weekday, any time on a weekend or holiday and any time when the court is closed during an emergency, (2) where the police have been summoned by an emergency call, (3) there has been no arrest of the perpetrator because he or she has absconded and (4) the petitioner is in immediate danger or subject to future bodily harm in the interval of time before the Court is again open; and it is further

**ORDERED,** that during the pilot program, procedures for obtaining an ETPO will be available in Metropolitan Police Districts Six (6) and Seven (7), and ETPO's will be processed in the Seventh (7<sup>th</sup>) District; and it is further

**ORDERED**, The Office of the Attorney General will have an "on call" attorney who will review the petition for sufficiency and make a recommendation whether the petition should be issued. If the petition is sufficient, and an assistant attorney general recommends issuance, the police will contact the Superior Court emergency judge through the Mayor's Command Center. A telephonic hearing on the petition for ETPO may be held with the victim, or the judge may arrange an in-person hearing. The desk sergeant on duty at the metropolitan police station handling the petition will act as court clerk for purposes of supplying forms to the victim, administering oaths and, whether or not an ETPO is granted, faxing copies of all paperwork to the Court Clerk; and it is further

**ORDERED**, that ETPO's issued pursuant to this administrative order will expire at the end of the next business day unless the petitioner appears in the Domestic Violence

clerk's office or the Southeast DV Unit to request a further extension. In no event may the order exceed 14 days without in person judicial review during normal court business hours. All other laws, rules, and regulations that apply to temporary protection orders will apply to ETPO's; and it is further

**ORDERED**, if the emergency judge finds that an ETPO should be issued, the emergency judge will direct the Metropolitan Police Department to fill out an ETPO form order, which shall include the names of the judge, the police officer and the assistant attorney general who have participated in drafting and reviewing the petition. The judge may authorize the police officer to sign the order on behalf of the court or may require the officer to deliver or fax an original order for signature; and it is further

**ORDERED**, that this Administrative Order and pilot project shall take effect on May 1, 2007 and remain in effect until January 15, 2008.
