

**SUPERIOR COURT OF THE DISTRICT OF COLUMBIA
ADMINISTRATIVE ORDER 25-07**

(Amending Standards of Practice for the Mental Health Panel Attorneys)

WHEREAS, the District of Columbia Family Court Act of 2001, Pub. L. 107-114 Stat. 2100 (2002) provides that the Superior Court shall establish standards of practice for attorneys appointed as counsel in matters under the jurisdiction of the Family Court of the Superior Court; and

WHEREAS, Attorney Practice Standards for the Mental Health Panel Attorneys were adopted in Administrative Order 15-16; and


WHEREAS, Attorney Practice Standards for the Mental Health Panel Attorneys require that annually, all counsel who are eligible to participate in mental health proceedings must attend 16 hours of continuing formal legal training on mental health-related topics to continue representing the respondents in these proceedings; and subsequent experience has demonstrated that the number of hours should not be higher than the highest number of hours required for other Family Court panels; that is, 12 hours.

NOW, THEREFORE, it is by the Court,

ORDERED, that the Amendment to Attorney Practice Standards for the Mental Health Panel shall take effect on the date of this order and shall govern practice in mental health proceedings in the District of Columbia Superior Court.
