 have been paid.
- The application must include one recent, color, clear passport style photo of the applicant, with the applicant's head centered, 2 inches by 2 inches, without any retouching and saved as a separate JPEG (.jpg) image. The image shall be saved as the applicant's bar number, "900911". If no bar number is available, it should be "barLastNameFirstNameM" with no spaces.
- Applications with all supporting documents must be saved as one PDF and emailed as an attachment to FamilyCourtPanels@dcsc.gov and CCANStaff@dcsc.gov.
